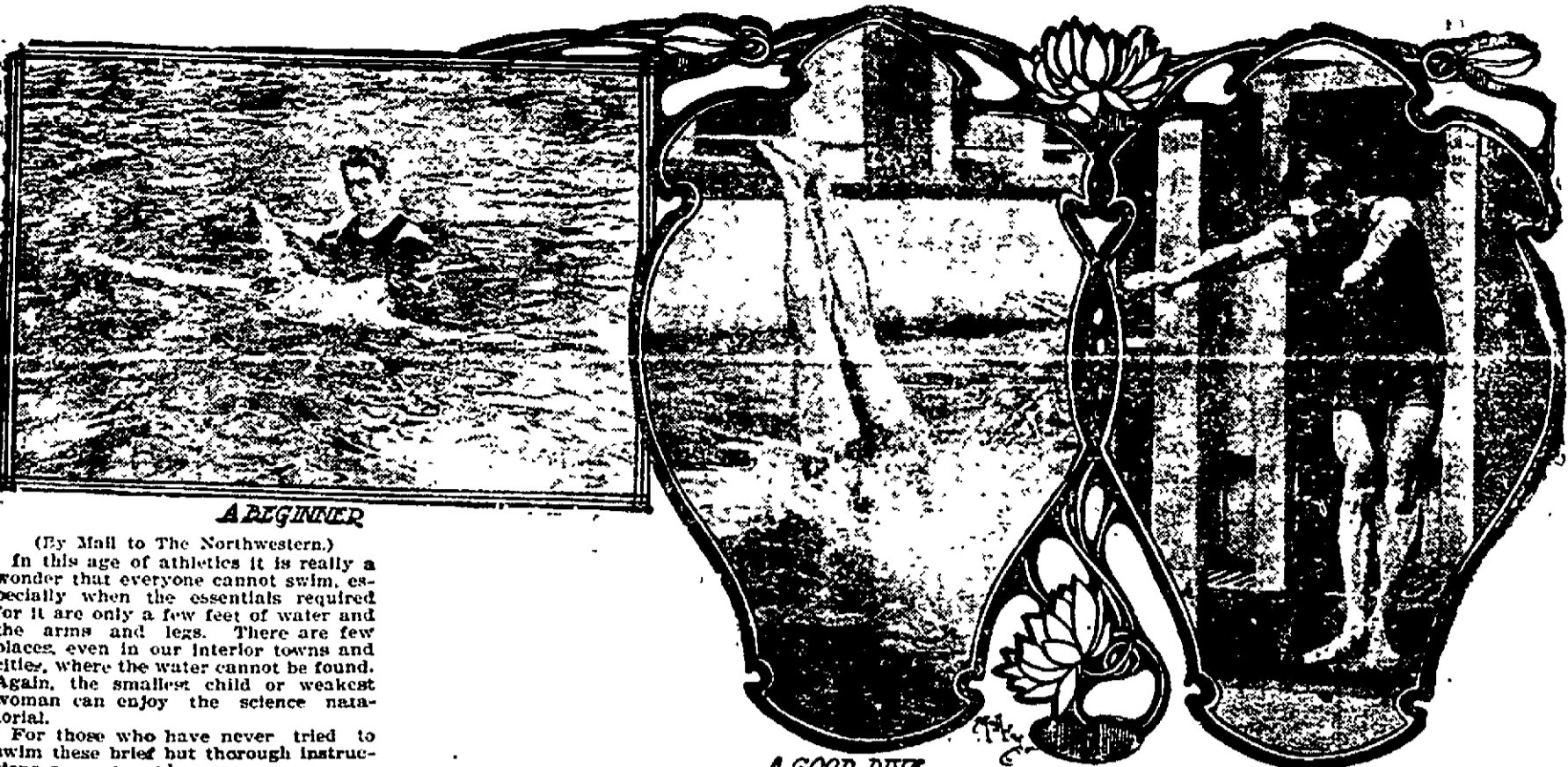


Hints on Swimming—Good Advice to Beginners



(By Mail to The Northwestern.) In the age of athletics it is really a wonder that the essentials required for it are only a few feet of water and the arms and legs. There are few places, even in our inland towns and cities, where the water cannot be found. Again, the smallest child or weakest woman can enjoy the science natural.

Some suggestions to those spending the summer on Lake Winnebago or adjoining water. Flat, palms downward, and bring them straight round in a line with the shoulders; from there bend the elbows back and bring the hands together at the water level. For the legs, lean the face downward on a stool, draw the legs up, then kick them out as wide as possible, then bring the legs straight together. The leg movement is the same as on the back.

ways remember—keep the hands and legs under the water. Many beginners get frightened by having so much of the water wash over their faces. This can always be overcome by keeping the hands under the water. When you have mastered these arm movements fairly well commence on the leg strokes. Start with the legs straight and out, the heels together, draw the feet up toward the body, keep the knees well turned out as far as possible. Shoot the arms out wide, then finish the kick by bringing the legs straight together with a snap. This stroke and way of swimming on the back will be found to be not only the easiest but the best for one can lie on his back and rest by simply stretching out the arms back over the head in a straight line with the body.

For the breast stroke commence by practicing the arm and leg movements on shore. The hands should be brought together to the chest and shot out straight in front then turn the hands

The Markets

NEW YORK—WALL STREET. New York, July 12.—(Wall Street)—A number of railroad stocks showed small opening gains, but these were yielded in the case of St. Paul and Missouri Pacific. The most important industrial stocks declined. Rock Island rose 1/2 points. Otherwise the changes were very small and the trading dull. Slight change in wheat, but the market became generally flat, but the wide fluctuations in special stocks confused the sentiment somewhat. Rock Island advanced 4 points to 122, and the market became generally flat. The principal fraction when Amundson broke 10 points, but Atchison was taken in large blocks at an advance of over a point. COMMERCIAL

CHICAGO—GRAIN. Chicago, Ill., July 12.—Rains predicted yesterday did not materialize today and as a consequence of the continued hot weather, wheat opened easier with light trade. Cables were somewhat higher, but the foreign markets failed to respond to the advance to the extent to the advance here yesterday. There was considerable chalking going on in the pit, traders letting go the nearby deliveries and taking on the deferred futures. September opened 1/2c lower at 73 1/2c, but there was a good demand at the top figures and prices advanced to 73 3/4c. Top figures were 28 cars, with 7 of contract grade. Minneapolis and Duluth reported 24 cars, making a total for the three points of 34 cars, against 24 cars a year ago. Trading continued light throughout the session, with a narrow range and the close was 1/2c lower at 73 1/2c. Corn opened somewhat easier on improved weather and trading was light. There was almost nothing doing in July options, which opened 1/2c lower at 66c. Later sales were made at 66c, but shorts appeared and over-anxious to cover. September opened 1/2c lower at 64 1/2c. The parties who are on the long side in the July deal are reported again buying in September and the advanced slightly, with the market feeling favorable weather with some light local inspection today, and a total of 20 of contract grade.
